NOTE FROM CAGJ'S BOARD PRESIDENT

Welcome to CAGJ's annual report for 2025. And welcome to our 25th anniversary year!

After 25 years, our name still embodies our approach: we work in solidarity with front-line organizers locally and internationally in support of the communities and ecosystems that sustain all of us and versus the predatory colonizers who think they own the world with their supremacist systems of extraction and repression.

It's generational work that requires us to sustain ourselves and each other for the long haul. We take inspiration from our movements and our allies as we live—not just in resistance to the world our would-be overlords tell us is inevitable, but in joyful expression of our full selves—creating spaces that make another world not just possible, but real, here, now.

In today's USA, we face an escalating assault on immigrants, on anyone who isn't Christian, on trans, queer, poor, working, and disabled people, on women, black, indigenous and all people of color, on freedom of speech, and on the living world itself. Outside the USA, "our" government sponsors genocide and carries out mass murder in our name on multiple fronts of military and economic warfare.

We refuse to submit to these campaigns of hatred and isolation. Instead we speak out, sing out, and fill the streets with colorful expressions of our resistance, solidarity, and joy. At the No Kings rallies, May Day march, Art & Revolution convergences, and at our own community dinners, CAGJ is turning joyful expression into fierce resistance.

Every pulse of life, every act of love, every time we make art, every time we sing, every time we find joy, it's an act of resistance. Let us stand together! Break bread together! Make art together!

While the future of CAGJ was uncertain in 2025, we continued to find our purpose in doing transnational, cross-sectoral organizing in solidarity and in partnership with Food Sovereignty movements locally and globally. We organized webinars, we connected artists to activists, we lobbied Congress for a healthy sustainable food system, we helped lay the groundwork for a new campaign for African Food Sovereignty, we engaged the community to learn from our movement history, and we stood with our allies in times of need.

In the Fall, we received word that CAGJ received a bequest from the estate of dearly missed social justice organizer Elaine Nonneman. Her loving appreciation for our work enabled us to enter 2026 on solid financial footing, with Heather Day back at the helm.

With deep gratitude and blessings to Elaine, and to all the thousands of community members whose contributions have sustained our work through the years, here's to 25 more years!

Art & Revolution

In 1998, Art & Revolution was founded to use art as a means to organize the massive direct action that shut down the WTO in November 1999. Working with the Museum of History and Industry (MOHAI), Art & Revolution was revived in 2025 when CAGJ helped organize a weekend-long skills share in April. Over 60 people participated, including members of our Solidarity Campaign partners Block Corporate Salmon and Community to Community.

In August 2026, CAGJ will co-host our second Art & Revolution Convergence, an arts organizing and strategies skillshare. Partnering with 3 activists who founded Art & Revolution - David Solnit, Jo Redline Christian and Dana Schuerholz - we'll build art for campaigns led by La Resistencia, Jewish Voice for Peace, and CAGJ's AGRA Watch program. We'll be joined by a Seattle art collective who created a beautiful installation partly inspired by their participation in last year's Art & Revolution gathering that you may have seen at the MLK or No Kings Marches (featured on the cover of this report)! We are excited to pick up where we left off a few years ago, when we held our Arts & Activism program. There is still time to join CAGJ's Art Collective who will build giant puppets in August to protest the Gates Foundation in solidarity with the African Food Sovereignty movement!

Starting in the Fall of 2024, CAGJ helped organize several educational events to mark the 25th anniversary of the mass direct action that shut down the World Trade Organization in Seattle on November 30, 1999. Our organization is strongly committed to telling this story of how people collectively took on corporate power and won, because that's how CAGJ came into being, and it's important to inspire people to believe that another world is possible!

In 2025, in conjunction with MOHAI's exhibit, *Teamsters, Turtles, and Beyond: The Legacy of the Seattle WTO Protests*, CAGJ co-hosted an interactive **WTO story-telling event** featuring Walden Bello, author, activist and former Filipino Congressman; Sonja Sivesind, Direct Action Network organizer in 1999; Pete Knutsen, Loki Fish Co and Seattle Central; Cindy Domingo, NW LELO; and Jonathan Rosenblum, Seattle Union Now in 1999.

Over the course of the year, Heather Day led several **WTO Protest Walking Tours** of downtown Seattle, with MOHAI, UW classes and other folks, bringing together young people born after 1999 with Seattleites who have their own stories of the impact of that week-long protest.

In the Spring we co-organized the weekend-long **Art & Revolution Convergence** which started with a Teach-in about how arts organizing led to the successful shut-down of the WTO. Next we held a hands-on workshop at MOHAI, followed by the creation of a beautiful community mural. Most of the participants gathered for a joyous full Sunday at Vashon Green School despite the rain. We're so excited to offer an even more hands-on program this summer!

Community Education

Farmworker Solidarity

In January 2026 we joined Community to Community (C2C) and Familias Unidas por la Justicia (FUJ) for their **13th annual Farmworker Tribunal** at the Washington State Capitol in Olympia. It was a special day, as members of both organizations were testifying in favor of Senate Bill 6045, legislation sponsored by Senator Rebecca Saldaña that aimed to grant union recognition and collective bargaining rights to Washington's farmworkers. As FUJ's Political Director Edgar Franks explained, "**Collective bargaining would allow farmworkers to secure workplace standards proactively**, rather than relying solely on litigation after violations take place. At the same time, corporate consolidation in agriculture continues to squeeze both farmworkers and small farmers, concentrating power in the hands of a few large operations. That's why legislation like this is not only good for farmworkers—it is good for the Washington farm industry as a whole."

Unfortunately, the fight for farmworkers' collective bargaining rights failed in 2026. Thus we are even more committed to supporting our partners when the legislation is re-introduced next year! The Domestic Workers Bill of Rights was passed this session, landmark legislation to improve conditions for vulnerable workers; however, farmworkers remain excluded from labor protections in WA and across the country, as they have been for almost one hundred years.



In this politically repressive time, visible farmworker leaders are being targeted and detained by ICE. A major focus in 2025 was raising the visibility of our farmworker partners' call to **FREE LELO!** - aka Alfredo Juarez, who was detained by ICE after being violently arrested just days after he advocated for the end of H-2A guest worker programs in Olympia. After suffering through weeks in detention, Lelo made the decision to self-deport to Mexico. He is dearly missed, however we are heartened to hear how he is continuing to organize in his new community.

In 2025 CAGJ's Director Heather Day was recognized by C2C, who presented her with the **Seeds of Justice Cultivating Movement award** for "never tiring of the struggle". Being honored alongside human rights defenders was truly special!

Several members of **C2C's Activism team** joined the **April 2025 Art & Revolution Convergence**. In 2026 C2C will be working with one of the Art & Revolution artist facilitators, Jo Redline Christian, to build puppets for future actions. We look forward to continued collaboration with our Farmworker partners in the months and years ahead.

Block Corporate Salmon

In February 2025, CAGJ joined the online celebration of everything that had been collectively accomplished by so many over decades to stop genetically engineered Salmon, hosted by Friends of the Earth. We are grateful to Block Corporate Salmon who continue to lead this campaign as the fight continues to defend the sacred salmon.

Block Corporate Salmon (BCS) started as a grassroots campaign made up of queer, Black, Indigenous, and people of color organizing in direct solidarity with Salmon People. The mission was to raise awareness about the local and global threats of genetically engineered salmon and build responsibility amongst the larger public to do everything in our power to stop AquaBounty and lift up Indigenous solutions around this issue, including dam removal and restoration of habitat.

After AquaBounty's demise at the end of 2024, the campaign has been able to turn to its visionary fiction roots, focusing on the liberation of Wild Salmon and Salmon Peoples by holding intergenerational community space to imagine the future of Wild Salmon and continue to educate the public about the threats to this future. Today, the campaign is focused on a collaboration with Salmon People in Alaska and the Pacific Northwest where the last wild salmon fisheries left on the planet are located.

While focused on regional work, the campaign continues to closely monitor AquaBounty and the company that bought the rights to their (GE) AquAdvantage® salmon, Cooke Aquaculture, which is also the world's biggest private seafood company and the culprit behind the 2017 salmon net-pen spill that released 200,000 Atlantic salmon into Pacific waters. BCS continues to reject land-based aquaculture as a solution to food security and supports the Global Fight Against Industrial Aquaculture campaign. Storytelling and art continue to be at the forefront of what BCS does, such as the zine they released in collaboration with A Growing Culture in 2024 (check in out on CAGJ's website).

AGRA WATCH

In June 2025, **AGRA Watch co-hosted “Gates’ Global Power Grab”**, a webinar which brought together leaders across the education, public health, climate justice, and food sovereignty movements to critically examine Gates’ legacy. Since 2000, the Gates Foundation has used private wealth to influence global agendas toward corporate-friendly, market-driven solutions. While Gates has successfully paved the way for corporate capture of public goods, many of his ventures have ended in failure, leaving communities worse off. Now Gates is doubling down—pledging \$200 billion to “develop” Africa—raising urgent questions about consent, power, and whose future is being designed by whom.



Working with A Growing Culture and US Right to Know, AGRA Watch convened the webinar to strategize how to confront the power of billionaire philanthropy. It was expertly moderated by Tim Schwab, an investigative journalist and author of *The Bill Gates Problem: Reckoning with the Myth of the Good Billionaire*. Speakers included Anuradha Mittal on false solutions to the climate crisis, Nicoletta Denticio on public health and Gates’ failed Covid response, Jesse Hagopian on how Gates undermines public education, and Gabriel Manyangadze on the call for reparations from African organizations holding Gates responsible for their devastating impact on African agriculture. Watch the webinar on CAGJ’s YouTube channel, and check out the Resource Guide on our website about the Foundation’s interventions in U.S. education, Covid response, African agriculture, the climate crisis and techno fixes, reparations, and Gates’ influence over media.

In the Fall, we co-hosted another webinar, **“Who Rules the Roost? Corporate vs Community Poultry in Africa”** inspired by GRAIN’s report of the same name. Their research shows how the Gates Foundation is causing harm not only to African crops, but also to the livestock sector. Indigenous chicken breeds that are locally adapted are central to food security, rural economies, traditional rituals, and biodiversity in Africa. Now these local varieties are under threat, as companies are trying to control the sector, often with the support of African governments. Rather than working to protect local chicken breeds, Gates is targeting small-scale producers by introducing imported hybrid breeds which require vaccines, industrial feed, and must be re-purchased year after year. GRAIN’s research demonstrates the many investments Gates has made in this sector.

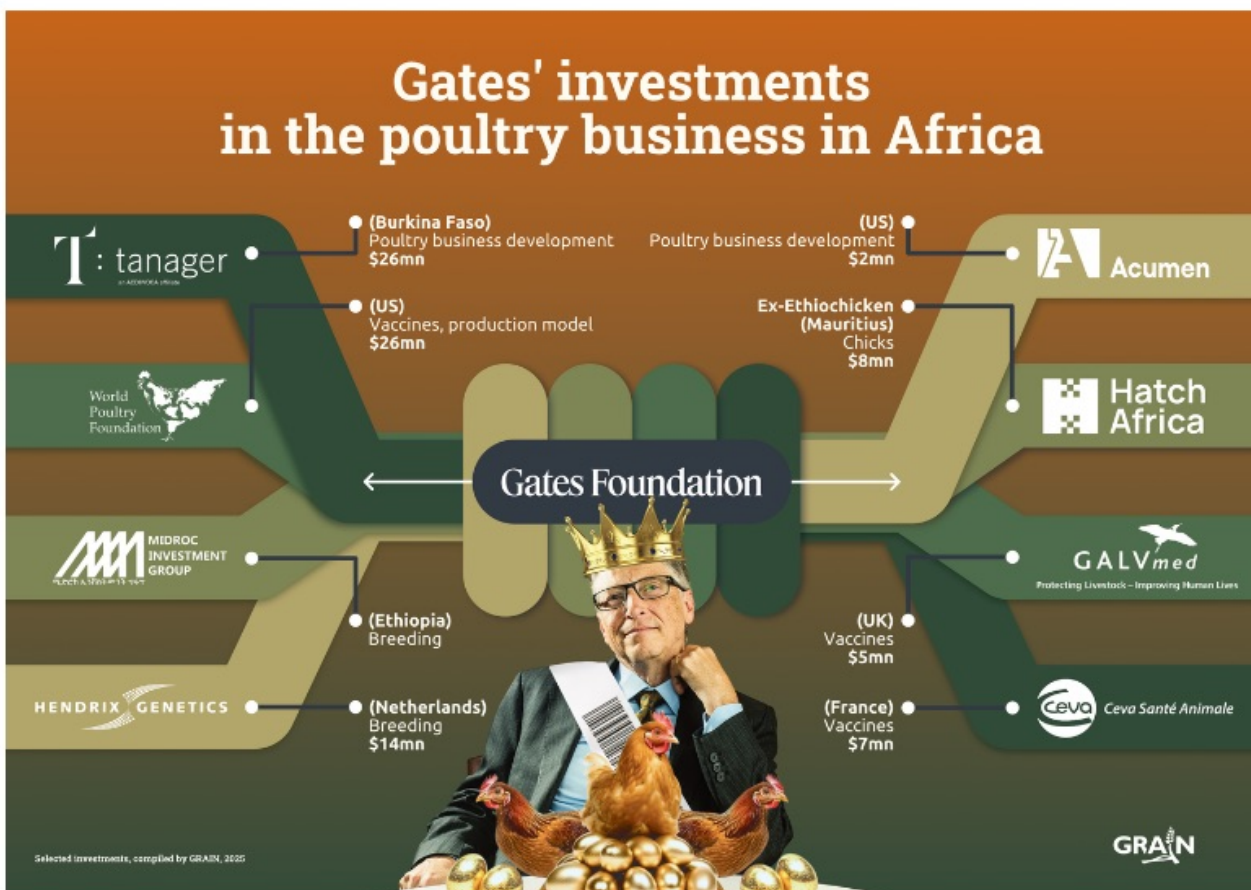
Campaigns



Several organizations worked together to organize the webinar - Alliance for Food Sovereignty in Africa, Southern African Faith Communities Environment Institute, Seed & Knowledge Initiative, GRAIN and CAGJ - in order to share strategies for how to protect local chickens from the encroachment of the industrial system. Out of this first gathering, farmers and food sovereignty advocates began organizing across the continent. Now, **an exciting new campaign is emerging, which will be launched at the World Social Forum in Benin** in August 2026. CAGJ has been helping to convene bi-monthly organizing meetings (in three languages - French, Arabic, and English!), and plans to amplify the campaign this year through education and mobilization in our communities.

The Gates Foundation is also pushing artificial intelligence on African agriculturists in a multitude of ways, which AGRA Watch member Matt Canfield's research aims to illuminate in the Kenyan context. In May, Matt is participating in **"EarthKeepers vs AI Empires: a movement convergence on AI, Digitization, Ecology, Sovereignty, and Justice"**, taking place in Zambia. Convened by several organizations, the aim is for diverse movements to "discuss different tech futures and visions and to chart out a common agenda to resist and expose the harmful impacts of AI and digitalization on communities, territories, and the web of life." AGRA Watch will be following the outcomes of this convergence, as our partners in Zambia have been calling for our support as AGRA increases its policy influence in the Southern African region.

For years, AGRA Watch has convened monthly Zoom calls with allies working in cities across the world - Nairobi, Lusaka, Dakar, Harare, Mexico City, London, Amsterdam, Paris, Boston. It's important to also meet in person when possible, even though it's a challenge! In March 2025, Matt Canfield participated in an AFSA strategy session in Nairobi, *Shifting Financial Power: Defunding Industrial Agriculture, Redirecting Funds to Agroecology*, and he will be in Lusaka for the above-mentioned convergence in May. AGRA Watch hopes to be able to participate in AFSA's 5th Africa Food Systems Forum this fall. We will continue dialoguing with our international partners on how to best utilize our strategic location in Seattle to take on the Gates Foundation!



Strengthening our Food Sovereignty Movement

CAGJ is keen to strengthen the Food Sovereignty movement by actively participating in strategic coalitions and alliances –that’s why we are members of the National Family Farm Coalition, US Food Sovereignty Alliance, and Alliance for Food Sovereignty in Africa.

CAGJ participated in NFFC’s annual Fly-In advocacy days, joining coalition members from around the country who gather every winter in “the other Washington” to learn about each other’s legislative priorities, and to meet with representatives’ offices. Members were organized into five lobbying groups, each headed by a NFFC staff person, to advocate for legislation to support farmers: mandatory country-of-origin labeling for meats, support for small dairy farms, on-farm slaughter, fair credit for farmers, and farmland for farmers.



In 2025 Heather Day lobbied Congressmembers to pass Mandatory Country of Origin Labeling (MCOOL) for American beef – thousands of small-scale ranching operations are being put out of business due to an unfair WTO ruling and Congress’ not acting to protect them. In 2026 Board member Karen Cowgill participated in her first NFFC meeting! Her group spoke to staffers in nine legislators’ offices seeking support and co-sponsorship for the Farmland for Farmers act authored by Sen. Cory Booker (D-NJ). This bill would block large corporations and entities not engaged in farming from buying up farmland as a speculative asset. The issue of farmland ownership hits close to home for CAGJ in its fight for a just food system, fair treatment of farm workers, an agroecological approach to farming, and exposing and opposing the influence of philanthrocapitalists like Bill Gates, who as of 2025 was the single largest private farmland owner in the US.

CAGJ co-coordinates the annual **Food Sovereignty Prize** awarded by US Food Sovereignty Alliance. In 2025, CAGJ member Noël Lum nominated the **New Mexico Acequia Association**, who won the domestic prize; she presented the commemorative plaque in person! **Association Nourrir Sans Détruire (ANSND)**, (Nourish without Destroying Association), located in Burkina Faso, was our 2025 international honoree. USFSA is in an exciting phase of rebuilding, and plans to host a national gathering in March 2027. Heather Day was hired to help kick-start the organizing, building off the energy generated by the 3rd Nyéléni Global Forum that took place in Sri Lanka in the Fall of 2025.

In June CAGJ members participated in **Resilience and Resistance: Cross-Pollinating Food Movements**, a conference in Portland, OR. It was wonderful to see two former Food Justice Project Co-Chairs - Maria Elena Rodriguez and Chris Iberle - presenting their current food justice work wearing their professional hats, with DAISA and the City of Seattle respectively. Heather Day moderated the opening panel featuring Malik Yakini, founder of Detroit Black Community Food Sovereignty Network, and Rosalinda Guillen, founder of Community to Community Development - both of whom have given SLEE Keynotes.

Locally, CAGJ members have built community through monthly dinners hosted by Heather Day at her home and at local African restaurants. We've engaged in outreach and education at annual events including **Northwest Folklife in May** and **Farm Fest at Rainier Beach Urban Farm & Wetlands in September**. Tabling at FolkLife at Seattle Center is a great opportunity to bring attention to the harms caused by the Gates Foundation, whose headquarters is just across the street.



CAGJ members have been in the streets throughout the year. We joined the May Day International Workers' Day March carrying our banner, and passing out leaflets to demand Lelo's release from detention. We protested DOGE cuts and defended federal workers; we've protested ICE and demanded the closure of NW Detention Center in Tacoma; we've protested war and genocide and uplifted Palestinians' rights to Food Sovereignty. In such hard times, we find community in collectively raising our voices.

In the past year CAGJ members have also supported an artist collective whose members were inspired by the April 2025 Art & Revolution Convergence to build a beautiful installation for the first Hands-Off No Kings March. For subsequent No Kings Marches, CAGJ members have joined art-builds and helped to mobilize the installation which aims to make protest irresistible! We are excited to continue collaborating, as this collective will join our August 2026 Art & Revolution gathering.



FINANCES & FUNDRAISING

At the end of 2024, CAGJ started transitioning to a volunteer-led collective, and reduced our Executive Director's position to part-time. While we continued to organize, the uncertainty about the organizations' future led to some members reducing or ending their financial donations. However, dozens of Monthly Sustainers kept their donations coming, which helps a great bit with our monthly expenses, so we are very grateful to each of you!

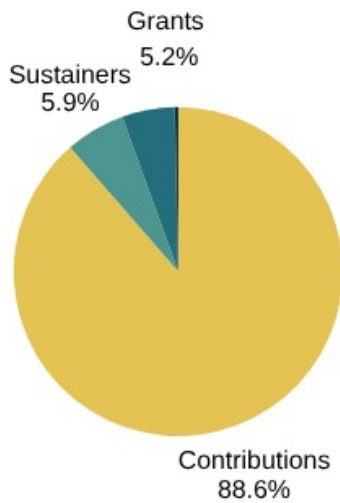

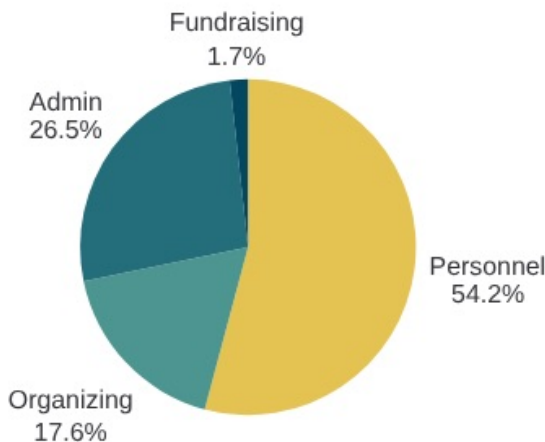
